Message from the Chair



"Collaboration and Partnership is in our DNA"

Dear friends and colleagues – I recently had an opportunity to reflect on the wonderful partnerships and collaborations we have developed throughout our community in Seattle, in King County, and beyond. Here at UW, we are working closely with the UW Schools of Medicine, Social Work, Nursing, Public Health, and Education as we pursue our vision of a future where mental health is an important part of all health and where mental health care becomes an integral part of all health

care.

We have a long tradition of caring for many of the county's most severely mentally ill patients in the psychiatric intensive care units at Harborview Medical Center, at the Harborview Mental Health Center and at a number of downtown programs serving individuals with severe and persistent mental illness. More recently, we have partnered with King County and others on initiatives to improve care for high users of hospital and emergency services, on crisis diversion efforts as alternatives to psychiatric hospitalization, and on the development of a highly popular Peer Bridger Program that helps our patients transition from inpatient care to community-based services.

Over the past five years, we have created new partnerships that serve high-risk mothers, veterans, family members of veterans and uninsured patients with mental illness in more than a dozen community health clinics throughout King County. We have supported a mobile team that cares for homeless individuals with severe mental illness in South King County. We have trained dozens of psychiatrists, primary care providers, and social workers who are participating in these programs. We continue to support these teams through weekly consultation from experienced faculty psychiatrists and psychologists. These new programs have helped us reach more people in need, but they have also helped us provide important support to social workers and other master's prepared mental health care providers who are working in stressful jobs with a very high risk of burn-out.

Reaching beyond King County, we have partnered with the Community Health Plan of Washington to expand our primary care consultation services to more than 150 clinics state-wide. Over the past five years, this Mental Health Integration Program has served more than 50,000 individuals with severe depression, posttraumatic stress disorder, bipolar disorder, and other serious mental disorders. We are

now building on these partnerships to test new approaches to caring for patients with serious mental disorders such as bipolar disorder and posttraumatic stress disorder in rural and remote clinics in Washington and beyond.

We have also partnered with community mental health centers in Seattle and South King County to improve medical care for those living with severe mental illnesses. We have helped these organizations win federal grants to create new primary care services and we have supported them throughout the life of these grants. Looking ahead, we hope to partner with the State of Washington and with the Washington Community Mental Health Council to help strengthen our community mental health centers in their capacity to provide whole-person care that will reduce the high rates of mortality in individuals living with severe and persistent mental illnesses.

Building on our successful Partnership Access Line (PAL), we have recently initiated a tele-psychiatry consultation program that will serve community hospitals with limited access to psychiatry and we were able to garner philanthropic support for a new consultation program in perinatal psychiatry that will ultimately serve health care providers caring for high risk mothers throughout our state.

Here at UW, we are strengthening our partnership with the School of Social Work to train social workers in evidence-based collaborative care for mental health and substance use problems and we have started a new partnership with the School of Education and invested department resources in a new center on school based mental health called the SMART Center. This program has shared fellows and faculty who work together to improve mental health care in Seattle and King County Schools.

These are just a few examples of the many ways in which our faculty and staff collaborate with colleagues across UW and with health and social service programs throughout our state. I am convinced that investments in these kinds of partnerships are our best chance to achieve our goals to (1) improve access to effective mental health care today, (2) train, inspire, and support the next generation of mental health care workers, and (3) discover better treatments for tomorrow. I want to say a big thanks to all of you and to our partners and collaborators here at UW and throughout the state as we pursue this dream.

Department Diversity Committee Update

The Diversity Committee continues to discuss and analyze the results of the spring 2015 department climate survey. Additionally, more detailed quantitative analyses of the responses regarding burnout ratings have been conducted. Children's) and no significant differences between men and women. There are statistical trend level differences in burnout ratings when comparing faculty identifying themselves as under-represented minority to non-under-represented minority (mean (sd) 54.6 (29.7) and 43.2 (25.0) respectively).

The committee discussed strategies to address the issues regarding faculty burnout across the department and suggested that sites and work areas engage in listening and learning sessions to identify from faculty members themselves what approaches to address burnout would be most helpful. In response to this, the November faculty meeting at Harborview will be an open forum to discuss burn out and we hope other sites will consider similar efforts.



Analyst Spotlight Series: Joan Russo Several faculty members in our department have unique analytic skills that strengthen our department as a whole. This month we highlight Statistician, Associate Professor Joan Russo, PhD.

Dr. Russo works simultaneously with many faculty members writing grant proposals,

analyzing their research data, and transforming the results into a narrative for publication. For over two decades, Joan provided statistical and analytic support to Wayne Katon. More recently, she has worked with Doug Zatzick on the Trauma Survivors Outcomes and Support Studies (TSOS). The TSOS studies seek more efficient ways to find patients who are at risk for PTSD, alcohol use, suicide, or depression development. For this endeavor, Dr. Russo created a ten-factor-risk-index database that, based on answers given to specific questions, can calculate, with excellent accuracy, a patient's potential development of these psychological disorders. Her index database lives outside of its grant, as it is being used by other researchers in their work, and is part of the National Trauma Center dissemination and implementation efforts.

Dr. Russo is currently analyzing data for grants affiliated with the AIMS Center, John Fortney's PCORI grant, and Nancy Grote's Mom Care Grant in the School of Social Work. She is also submitting grants with Lydia Chwastiak and Amy Bauer. Along with all her grant work, Dr. Russo has provided outstanding methodological training and support to department residents, fellows, and junior faculty for more than two decades.

Pilot Research Awards in

clinical best practice hub of a new National Training and Technical Assistance Center for Child, Youth and Family Mental Health funded by SAMHSA.

The new Center will be operated by the National Technical Assistance Network for Children's Behavioral Health (TA Network), a partnership of 14 universities and organizations across the country that is coordinated by the Institute for Innovation & Implementation at the University of Maryland School of Social Work. The TA Network includes the foremost leaders and designers of children's systems with years of experience developing, guiding and implementing reform.

The \$33 million contract represents the largest federal investment in training and technical assistance for children and youth with behavioral health needs in our nation's history. PBHJP will receive approximately \$350,000 annually for the duration of the five-year contract. Eric Bruns, who has been part of the TA Network since its founding, will serve as the UW principal investigator.

BHIP Forges Ahead

Department leadership met with leaders within the University of Washington Physicians Neighborhood (UWPN) clinics to discuss the continued evolution of the Behavioral Health Integration Program (BHIP). Department faculty members serve each of the UWPN clinics by providing supervision of depression care managers in the clinics and by providing direct consultation services for patients with behavioral health needs outside the scope of the care manager's role. These services are very well received and continue to demonstrate significant improvements in depression and anxiety outcomes. The meeting participants are working to better clarify the appropriate resources within the clinics, department, and community for meeting the behavioral health needs of the clinic patients. This includes identifying the appropriate procedures for referring UWPN patients to the community mental health center at Harborview and the Outpatient Psychiatry Clinic at UWMC-Roosevelt.

Department Active at UW Medicine Sleep Center

Professor **Barbara McCann**, **PhD** spends one day a week in the <u>UW</u> <u>Medicine Sleep Center</u> at Harborview treating patients with insomnia, sleep phase disorders, difficulties with continuous positive airway pressure (CPAP) use, and related problems with getting adequate restorative sleep.
