

Welcome to our new department newsletter!

With nearly 1,000 regular and clinical faculty, staff, and trainees, our interests vary widely and we don't often have the opportunity to meet in person. In this newsletter, we will profile some of the people and programs that make our Department special, introduce new staff and faculty, and share important developments with the primary goal of helping us all stay in touch. Later this month, we will also launch a new department website. Rosemary Whitright and her team have designed a state-of the art website with a new look and easy navigation and we will need all of your help with

- We are engaged in strategic planning efforts to better serve our patients as UW Medicine becomes an Accountable Care Network focused on improving the health of populations.
- We are working on expanding our clinical consultation programs in King County, throughout our State and across the WWAMI region.
- We are developing new programs in Maternal and Child Mental Health, Mental Health and Technology, Trauma, Innovative Behavioral Health Interventions, and Global Mental Health, and we are engaged in strategic planning efforts related to our Neurosciences and Addictions research portfolios.
- Our training programs continue to attract some of the best and brightest applicants from around the country and we are looking at new ways to improve our reach to help train and support a strong mental health mental health workforce around the state.
- We have recruited several new faculty members and staff in key leadership roles (see the "New Faculty and Staff" section) and we have a number of ongoing recruitments for faculty positions at UWMC, HMC, SCH, and the VA.
- We have initiated a new symposium series called 'State of Mind' in which we will introduce our department's strategic efforts and goals to community members who can help support our work through financial and other means.
- By far the most important asset we have is our diverse group of faculty, staff, and trainees. To further strengthen our team, we are establishing a new departmental diversity task force to help us recruit and retain trainees and faculty from underrepresented groups.

This list is just the tip of the iceberg and I will provide more information about all of these efforts in future newsletters and communications. In the meantime, I want thank those of you who are featured in this month's newsletter for your outstanding work and I would like to invite all of you to share your news, your ideas and suggestions for this newsletter and other ways we can stay in touch. ## Erik Carlson, MD, PhD - Acting Assistant Professor; Neurosciences



Erik completed his residency training with us in the Neuroscience Track. His research interests lie at the interaction between genes, circuits, and experience, and how these interactions elicit mental illness. He is particularly interested in how the cerebellum, which has reciprocal connections with the corticolimbic system, regulates cognition, social interaction, and affective states. Erik received a perfect score on his recently funded KO8 NIMH Career Development Award. He is working with his mentor, Larry Zweifel, PhD to investigate the role of genetic and virally targeted cell populations in deep cerebellar nuclei and cerebellar cortex in cognitive, social and affective function in mice.

# Cecilia Breinbauer, MD - Clinical Assistant Professor; Global Mental Health and Center of Excellence in Maternal and Child Mental Health



Cecilia is an experienced Child and Adolescent Psychiatrist and expert on Global Mental Health. She has a joint appointment in the Department of Global Health and will work with us to develop a new Center of Excellence in Maternal and Child Mental Health with both local and global projects. Dr. Breinbauer moved from Chile, her native country, to Washington DC where she collaborated with internationally renowned experts on child and young adolescent development and mental health at the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO), the Inter-American Development Bank (IADB), UNICEF, and various other nonprofit organizations.



Joe joined us as a fellow in Primary Care Psychiatry / Health Services Research after completing his residency at Mt. Sinai School of Medicine. He serves as an attending physician on the inpatient unit at UWMC and conducts research on improving recognition and quality of care for primary care patients with bipolar disorder seen in safety net settings. He also serves as a psychiatric consultant in the Washington State Mental Health Integration Program (MHIP) and works with the AIMS Center to develop training materials in Integrated Care for practicing psychiatrists.

# John Fortney, PhD - Professor and Associate Director of Research; Integrated Care & Public Health



John recently joined the Department as the Associate Director of Research for the Division of Integrated Care & Public Health (AIMS Center). Originally trained as a geographer, with an emphasis on spatial economics and econometrics, he has become one of only two geographers ever funded by NIMH and a leading expert in Mental Health Services Research. He joins us from the University of Arkansas where he directed a Division of Mental Health Services Research in the Department of Psychiatry. His research focuses on identifying and overcoming barriers to mental health care for rural and otherwise underserved populations and he is an expert in rural mental health and tele-mental health care. 
Ramanpreet Toor, MD – Acting Assistant Professor; Behavioral Health Integration Program

Doug Zatzick, MD, receives new NIH Research Awards To Address Multiple Chronic Conditions

Douglas Zatzick, MD received one of three new research awards from the National Institutes of Health's (NIH) <u>Health Care Systems (HCS)</u> <u>Research Collaboratory</u> to address the growing proportion of the U.S. population that has multiple chronic medical conditions. Dr. Zatzick's project -- A Policy Relevant U.S. Trauma Care System Pragmatic Trial for PTSD and Comorbidity -- focuses on patients who are being treated for acute physical injuries and who also have conditions such posttraumatic stress disorder, alcohol and drug use problems, depression, chronic pain, and other medical conditions. The trial will be conducted



in partnership with 20 Level I trauma centers across the United States. This project will be primarily overseen by the National Institute of Mental Health and secondarily by the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism. <u>Press release</u>

# **CLINICAL PROGRAMS**

Enhancing Rural Primary Care Access to Mental Health and Opioid Management Consultations in Washington Via Telehealth

Richard Veith, MD and colleagues in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences with support from faculty in Anesthesiology & Pain Medicine and in UW Medicine are conducting a four-year telehealth project funded by the HRSA Office for Advancing Telehealth to address critical shortages in mental health care and pain management in rural, underserved sites in Washington State. The lack of mental health services leads to under-treatment, higher rates of suicide, increased use of emergency services, and hospitalizations. Compounding the problems related to inadequate access to mental health care, primary care providers (PCPs) in rural areas report having inadequate skills to manage mental health problems, especially serious psychiatric disorders and conditions aggravated by cooccurring substance abuse. <u>Read more</u>.

# Behavioral Health Integration Program (BHIP) Expands to all Nine UW Neighborhood Clinics

Mental health services offered by UW Medicine will increase with the expansion of the Behavioral Health Integration Program (BHIP) to all nine UW Neighborhood clinics later this year. BHIP uses the Collaborative Care model developed at UW for treating common mental health conditions such as depression and anxiety in primary care. In BHIP, UW psychiatrists work as clinic-based psychiatric consultants who are responsible for supporting mental health care provided by primary care providers and behavioral health care managers as well as providing direct patient consultations. This allows us to reach patients in primary care where many of them present for care and to leverage the skills of psychiatric consultants to reach larger patient populations. <u>Read more</u>.

## **Treating Alcohol Addiction in Native Communities**

Faculty from the Departments of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences and Epidemiology are partnering with three American Indian and Alaska Native communities on an NIH-funded study to investigate whether or not motivational incentives can improve alcohol addiction treatment in American Indian and Alaska Native communities. <u>Read more</u>.

## **Global Mental Health**

The Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences and the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine have agreed to collaborate on research, training, and capacity building efforts in the areas of Global Health and Maternal and Child Mental Health. The vision outlined in the Memorandum of Understanding is to develop, evaluate, and help implement cost-effective interventions to improve well-being and health in underserved populations. This may include work in low and middle income countries but also in rural or otherwise underserved areas of high income countries such as those in Europe or the United States. ## The Language of Interaction

Behavioral interventions such as psychotherapy are leading, evidence-based practices for a variety of problems (e.g., substance abuse), but the evaluation of provider fidelity to behavioral interventions is limited by the need for human judgment. A recent paper by David Atkins, PhD, evaluated the accuracy of statistical text classification in replicating human-based judgments of provider fidelity in one specific psychotherapy—motivational interviewing (MI).
